

Read Matt. 9:9-13


- When Jesus "saw" Matthew he was sitting in the tax collectors booth doing an unjust and oppressive job. But the moment Jesus called him, he left that life behind and followed. Why do you think Matthew responded that way?
- Many of us are called by God out of our "tax booths", but we don't respond as quickly or at all. Would you say you are following Jesus right now? If not, who are you following?

9 As Jesus went on from there, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the tax collector's booth. "Follow me," he told him, and Matthew got up and followed him.

10 While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with him and his disciples. 11 When the Pharisees saw this, they asked his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?"
