ONE-MINUTE RECAP

During his sermon this week, Pastor Kyle discussed the high cost and lengthy process of repairing relationships.

- He said followers of Jesus need to take the initiative toward reconciliation regardless of whether we have been offended or are the offender.
- Aspiring followers of Jesus need to prioritize <u>making amends with God before</u> <u>addressing conflicts with others.</u>
- Through following Jesus, one can attain inner peace by establishing a connection with God.

 - 2) Do you think it's possible to have peace with others, even if you don't have peace with God?
