## Practice allowing God to examine the heart (Ps. 139:23-24)

What avenues or remedies do you look for to solve your sense of failure or disillusionment in yourself?

- Ask whoever is comfortable to share one specific example of dealing with personal failure. In those moments, what or where do you try to escape?
- Ask everyone to close their eyes and cover everyone with this verse in prayer:

Those who enter into Christ's being-here-for-us no longer have to live under a continuous, low-lying black cloud. A new power is in operation. The Spirit of life in Christ, like a strong wind, has magnificently cleared the air, freeing you from a fated lifetime of brutal tyranny at the hands of sin and death. God went for the jugular when he sent his own Son. He didn't deal with the problem as something remote and unimportant. In his Son, Jesus, he personally took on the human condition, entered the disordered mess of struggling humanity in order to set it right once and for all. (Rom. 8:2-4)



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
